Trial Chamber II ("Trial Chamber" or "Chamber") of the International Criminal Court ("Court"), in the case of *The Prosecutor v. Germain Katanga and Mathieu Ngudjolo Chui*, in accordance with Regulation 37(2) of the Regulations of the Court ("Regulations"), issues the following decision.

1. On 19 June 2009 the Defence for Germain Katanga requested the Chamber<sup>1</sup> to extend the page limit set at 20 pages pursuant to regulation 37(1) of the Regulations for "*its Motion for Declaration of Abuse of Process Resulting from Illegal Arrest and Detention of Germain Katanga and Stay of Proceedings*"<sup>2</sup>. The extension of the page limit was granted by the Chamber on the same day.<sup>3</sup>
2. The "Defence motion for a declaration on unlawful detention and stay of proceedings"<sup>4</sup> ("Defence Motion") was subsequently filed on 30 June 2009, the public redacted version of which was notified to the Prosecution on 2 July 2009.<sup>5</sup> The unredacted version of the Defence Motion was made available to the Prosecution on 3 July 2009.<sup>6</sup> The Defence Motion comprised 37 pages in total.
3. On 16 July 2009 the Office of the Prosecutor ("Prosecution") filed the "Prosecution Request for an Extension of the Page Limit for its Response to Defence Motion for a Declaration on Unlawful Detention and Stay of Proceedings".<sup>7</sup>

4. In its Request, the Prosecution argues that the circumstances of its response to the Defence Motion warrant an extension of page limit pursuant to regulation 37(2) of the Regulations.<sup>8</sup> The Prosecution bases its request on the Chamber's decision of 19 June 2009<sup>9</sup> in which it held that, having regard to the advanced stage of the proceedings, it is vital that the parties be given the opportunity to usefully respond to this motion, in full awareness of all the circumstances of the matter.<sup>10</sup> The Prosecution submits that it believes that it can best present its Response to the Defence Motion in a document not exceeding 40 pages,<sup>11</sup> contending that the circumstances are such as to constitute exceptional circumstances within the meaning of regulation 37(2) of the Regulations<sup>12</sup>, given the number of factual and legal issues addressed in the Defence Motion.
5. The Chamber notes that the Defence for Germain Katanga has been granted an extension of page limit by virtue of the Chamber's decision of 19 June 2009. Accordingly, it is the Chamber's view that it is essential for the integrity of the proceedings that the Prosecution is given the opportunity to meaningfully respond to all the factual and legal issues raised in the Defence Motion
6. By virtue of regulation 37(2) of the Regulations, the Chamber is vested with the power extend the page limit of documents filed with the Registry in exceptional circumstances at the request of a participant. The Chamber considers that, in order to address the large number of factual issues raised in the Defence Motion in due depth, a page limit of 20 is indeed unduly restrictive in the present case.


